



# Nativity of Jesus in Art - Colour

## Key Vocabulary

**Shade** – When a colour is made darker by adding black, e.g. a shade of blue (dark blue).

**Tint** – When a shade is made lighter by adding white, e.g. a tint of blue (light blue).

**Warm/cool colours** – Yellow, orange and red are warm colours. These colours create a warm mood. Blue, green and grey are cool colours. These colours create a cold mood.

**Method** – A way of doing something, for example the steps for painting a picture.

**Sketch** – A rough drawing or painting, possibly used to complete a finished drawing or painting.

**Religious work of art** – Shares a religious message. It might portray a sacred story or express an artist's faith.

**Style** – Some paintings seem to show exactly what an artist saw, while others focus on exploring shapes or expressing feelings.

**Technique** – The way in which an artist creates their own.

## A Brief History

The Nativity of Jesus has been a major subject of Christian art since the 4<sup>th</sup> century. The artistic depictions of the Nativity, celebrated at Christmas, are based on the narratives in the bible and in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke. Christian art includes many representations of the Virgin Mary and the Christ Child.

The Nativity has been depicted in many different media, both pictorial and sculptural. Pictorial forms include murals, panel paintings, manuscript illuminations, stained glass windows and oil paintings. Sculptural representations of the Nativity include free-standing sculptures which may be grouped together into a Nativity scene within or outside a church, home, public place or natural setting.
