Dear Parents,

I wanted to give you some feedback about one of our key priorities this academic year – 'Putting the heart back into Queensway':

Aims	Comment

As you can see, there has been huge successes which is wonderful to see. If you haven't already, please get involved with any of the activities that are relevant to you and your child listed above so we can continue to thrive as we re-build the Queensway community.

I also wanted to offer some feedback from the annual parent survey which took place in January. Firstly, a big thank you to everyone who completed it. We really value your feedback and reflect thoroughly on the results. Key headlines from the 45% of families who responded across Years 1-6:

- 95% said their child was happy at school
- 95% said their child felt safe at school
- 95% said they were aware of what their child was learning
- 97% said they would recommend Queensway School

The area where the results were slightly lower were:

- The school supports my child's wider development some parents reported they didn't understand the question fully. 'Wider development' is about how we develop skills beyond academic skills, for example, social skills, good mental health, physical health, values, become good citizens etc.
- The school has high expectations of my child 13% reported that they didn't know. High expectations regarding the child's attendance and punctuality, conduct and behaviour at school, completion of homework, effort and attitude in lessons, academic achievement are they reaching targets? Ask your child's class teacher at the next parents evening more about this.

We triangulate this information with the pupil survey too. So, thank you for all your feedback.

Class News

Nursery

In Nursery we jumped straight into exploring all about 'Paws, claws, and whiskers' this term and had so much fun creating a vets role play area, taking it in turns to be the vet, receptionist, and the owner of a pet. Our communication and language skills were used to take phone calls, book appointments, and express what was wrong with our poorly pets. We shared our own pet photos as a class and produced some very colourful artwork of our favourite animals using tissue paper, felt and paints. We even used our imagination to think of pets we may like when we are older, a baby rainbow unicorn and a five headed dragon were among the favourites. A highlight for us all was when we welcomed 'Raisin' a real-life rabbit into class and learnt lots about her especially her love of eating healthy foods!

The children have amazed us with their learning through Little Waddle phonics, learning a new sound each week as well as joining in with games to extend their knowledge of hearing blended words and actions. Understanding rhyming words through stories and nursery rhymes has shown so much growth in confidence in the children and is lovely to hear this is being shared at home also.

As a class we really enjoyed celebrating Chinese New Year and learnt so much about it

from our visitor, especially the 12 animals' story and the traditions on the day of sending money in envelopes and having new



clothes. We were extremely lucky to try on Chinese clothing and learnt a new skill of using chopsticks which helped us with noodle and rice play. Prawn crackers and fortune cookies finished our week of learning off nicely.



We are continuing to focus on how to keep our teeth healthy and have worked hard on creating our display, we are enjoying seeing photos and videos of different ways you are doing this at home. Please keep them coming in for us to share and talk about.

<u>Year 1</u>

<u>Year 3</u>

What an exciting term! We started the term by writing our very own versions of the story 'The Lift' and even published our writing into books, meaning Year 3 are officially authors. Please see some examples of our books below.



The children then enthusiastically embraced their inner Roman soldiers and wrote letters back home, telling their parents all about their life in the army. The children amazed us with their detailed research of life in the Roman army and their writing gave us a real sense of how tough life in the army could be. Most recently, we have learned a Roman kenning poem and children have focused on the aspects of performance poetry, such as expression and pace. You all made very believable soldiers!

In Maths, the children have confidently learnt how to add and subtract three-digit numbers. They've learnt a variety of methods, including column method. We've been impressed with their ability to exchange! Then, we learnt how to multiply and divide, moving from repeated addition and subtraction to grid method and chunking. After developing these methods, we then focused on worded problems.

Children in Year 3 have certainly become worded problem experts and can all now use RUCSAC effectively to help solve problems.

In Art, the children have overwhelmed us with their stunning range of mosaics, taking inspiration from Sue Kershaw and Alison Hepburn.



In Science, children have been learning all about forces and magnets and even investigated friction. Children have made great conclusions based on their results and are clearly scientists in the making.
