Art (Royal Paintings) Year 3, Term 5

This term, to link with our history focus of the Tudors, we will be focusing on paintings of Royalty. We will be looking at two specific artisits - Isobel Peachey and Hans Holbein.

Over the next 6 weeks, we will be:

- Carefully observing and discussing paintings
- Sketching designs, using simple line drawings
 - Painting, using watercolours
 - Evaluating and improving paintings.
 - Painting in the style of an artist.

Key vocabulary

Royalty – This is a person or group of people who are part of the Royal family.

<u>Evaluation</u> – This is where you discuss and develop your work, thinking about what worked well and how it could be improved.

<u>Line drawing</u> – This is where straight or curved lines are created against a light background, focusing on the outline of something, rather than the small details.

<u>Colour wash</u> – A technique used when painting, where water is added to the paint, to create different textures.

<u>Tones</u> – This refers to the lightness or darkness of a colour.

Isobel Peachey: a professional portrait painter. Isobel was hired for an official portrait of Her Majesty the Queen. More recently, Isobel painted a portrait of Her Royal Highness, Princess Anne.

Hans Holbein: a German painter, who painted portraits of Henry VIII and other members during the Tudor period. He even painted a portrait of a potential wife for Henry VIII!
