Head Teacher's News

I am sure many of you will know from 1st April 2022 Covid guidance changed. It is as follows:

- adults with the symptoms of a respiratory infection, and who have a high temperature or feel unwell, should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people until they feel well enough to resume normal activities and they no longer have a high temperature
- children and young people who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay at home and avoid contact with other people. They can go back to school, college or childcare when they no longer have a high temperature, and they are well enough to attend
- adults with a positive COVID-19 test result should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 5 days, which is when they are most infectious. For children and young people aged 18 and under, the advice will be 3 days
- regular asymptomatic testing is no longer recommended in any education or childcare setting, including in SEND, alternative provision, and children's social care settings.

This new era is about taking 'personal responsibility' so I urge all parents to ensure our community is kept safe and well, by following the above guidance. Many schools across Oxfordshire have had to revert to remote learning this term due to high staff absence so in order to prevent this at Queensway, everyone must play their part.

Parents are still required to notify school by 9am if their child is not going to be in school, giving full details of the reason for absence.

When we return after Easter, we will be stopping the one-way entrance and exit points. A huge thank you to all those parents who complied with this and challenged those that didn't! We still do ask however that only one parent comes on site where possible and that pathways are kept free of congestion. Talking of congestion, we have received complaints that some parents are still standing in the school's entrance points smoking and vaping, as well as parking on the central reservation on Queensway. Please stop as we work hard to a) respect our neighbours surrounding the school and b) your child's safety is paramount to us.

We hope that next term we can start taking part in sporting events with other schools, making the most of the summer weather. We are also busy planning some local trips, end of year events as well as introducing a couple more clubs. We even aim to have some parental shared lessons in Term 6...... remember those days! Parents in Nursery, Reception and Year 1 have never experienced Queensway life outside of Covid restrictions - parents would be welcomed into a lesson with their child every term as well as watching 3 assemblies per year. Parent partnership on site was always fantastic and something we have really missed.

For those parents that were able to attend the last round of parents evening, it was great to see you actually in the building and we hope it gave you all an opportunity to look at your child's work as well as speak with teachers. We don't have parents' evenings in the summer term, as you will be given the annual report instead in July. But of course, please just catch the teachers to make an appointment if you need to speak with them at any point.

Some families will be purchasing summer uniform over Easter so here is a reminder what it is:

SUMMER

Children may choose to wear grey knee-length shorts, or blue and white checked knee-length dresses.

Optional: Royal blue or grey headscarf. No leggings to be worn.

Of course, the winter uniform can still be worn:

WINTER

Trousers/skirt -Traditional style grey trousers. Jeans and tracksuit bottoms are not appropriate. Grey knee-length skirt or pinafore. **Shirt** - White polo shirt, white shirt, or blouse **Sweatshirt** - Royal blue jumper or cardigan or Queensway sweatshirt.

Socks - Plain, dark coloured or white socks or grey opaque tights

Footwear - Plain, black shoes or trainers for outside. Plain black plimsolls for indoors. No high heeled shoes please.

Year 1

We've had an exciting term in Year One. We have produced some amazing pieces of writing. We read 'The Secret of Black Rock' by Joe-Todd Stanton and wrote our own stories based on the book. We then looked at the story 'Where's My Teddy?' by Jez Alborough and wrote our stories based on losing a toy.

In Maths, we have counted to and across 100, recognised the place value of 2 digit numbers, found fractions of shape and number and revised addition and subtraction to 20. We have used practical equipment to represent

numbers, for example we found shapes around the classroom and folded them into halves. We have been working hard to answer our next steps and challenge ourselves.

In History, we have been learning about Florence Nightingale. We have looked at her life and how she changed hospitals. We wrote an information text about Florence and used conjunctions (joining words) to add information. The children's reports were clear and full of exciting facts.

In DT, we learnt about playgrounds. In groups, the children designed and made playgrounds using junk modelling resources. The children amazed us with their inventive ideas and thoughtful decisions during the design process.

Finally, the children took part in the National Science week by investigating the question: 'Are there more animals in the shade of a tree than an open space?'. Our children are natural explorers and made insightful predictions and conclusions.

Year 2

What another fantastic term we have had in Year 2! Lots of hard work and fun too.

In English we have looked at a variety of genres including story writing, instructions, and non-chronological reports. At the beginning of term, we looked at the story 'The First Hippo on the Moon' and wrote character and setting descriptions. We then innovated the story to write our own versions, changing the destination that the hippos went to and how they got there. Linked to our rocket making in DT, we wrote a clear set of instructions which included imperative verbs. We have also written two non-chronological reports based on our historical figures this term Neil Armstrong and Christopher Columbus.

In Maths this term we have looked at the operations of Multiplication and Division through the use of arrays and grouping. We have looked at the inverse relationship between them and used this to solve missing number problems. We have also looked at fractions for

the first time and have found $\frac{1}{2}$ $\frac{1}{4}$ and $\frac{1}{3}$, of shapes and amounts. We found fractions of

numbers using the bar model, thinking about how many equal parts we need to find. We have also been practising number skills such as our doubles, halves, number bonds and recalling our times tables facts. These skills need to be practised all of the time along with telling the time.

The Year 2 children have loved the topic of Space and Exploration this term. We have learnt all about the astronaut Christopher Armstrong and the explorer Christopher Columbus. We have made rockets in DT and learnt the countries and capitals of the UK, the seven continents and the five oceans. Lots of knowledge!

We would like to thank all our Year 2 families for their continued support. We hope you all enjoy your break, and we are looking forward to welcoming you back for Term 5.

Year 3

Year 4

What a fantastic term Year 4! We have been absolutely blown away by the enthusiasm and positivity that you have all shown throughout this term. Your constant desire to challenge yourselves is inspiring!

In English, we began the term by looking at the text 'The Lost Happy Endings' and the children have produced some incredible work, inspired by this text. They have really thought about the description they are trying to create for their readers and have wowed us with their vocabulary and wonderful ideas! We then took a trip to the circus for our final focus text of the term, 'Leon and the place between'. After some great discussions around the text and the language used, the children have thoroughly enjoyed writing a diary entry in character and writing letters to the author. In Maths, we have continued to develop lots of on-going skills and have introduced some new learning about decimals! The children have been fantastic at identifying and discussing the parts of a number, using the mathematical language. In Science this term, we have been learning all about teeth. We began our topic by creating our own set of teeth using clay, thinking carefully about the function of each tooth. We have also thoroughly enjoyed Science Week this term, where we worked in teams to create our own toothpaste and test its properties against other leading brands. Our artwork has focused on the artist Frida Kahlo and the children have begun to work towards creating their own self-portrait inspired by her style. We cannot wait to see and share the final pieces on our class blogs!

Year 5

This term, the children have really enjoyed immersing themselves further into our Ancient Greece topic. The children have been busy learning all about daily life in Ancient Greece as well as researching and making their own Greek flatbreads.

In maths, we have been focusing on developing our measurement skills, where children have been busy estimating, measuring, and converting between different units of measure. We have been really impressed with their use of STEM sentences this term and their written explanations.

In science, children have been learning all about 'Earth and Space' and have enjoyed creating leaflets about the first moon landing. Some children were also fortunate enough to go to Tudor Hall for a science filled day. As you can see below, the children thoroughly enjoyed themselves and couldn't wait to tell us about it.





We have also been lucky enough to have Science week in school, where the children had to plan their own investigation, thinking about their question and method, before then conducting their experiment and collecting their results. We were extremely impressed with the children's presentations, where they discussed their findings and conclusions, making it very difficult to crown our winners.

The Governor's challenge strategic aims are clear, ensure statutory requirements are in place and help identify opportunities for improvement.
